# Much Time Should Be Given To Prayer E.M. Bounds

What E. M. Bounds has learned in the "school of prayer" has had a profound impact on my prayer life, and I hope it will impact yours as well. He writes:

"While many private prayers, in the nature of things, must be short; while public prayers, as a rule ought to be short and condensed; while there is ample room for and value put on "arrow" prayers—yet in our private communions with God time is a feature essential to its value. Much time spent with God is the secret of all successful praying. Our short prayers owe their point and efficiency to the long ones that have preceded them. The short prevailing prayer cannot be prayed by one who has not prevailed with God in a mightier struggle of long continuance. Jacob's victory of faith could not have been gained without that all-night wrestling. God's acquaintance is not made by quick visits. God does not bestow his gifts on the casual or hasty comers and goers. Much time with God alone is the secret of knowing Him and influence with Him.

"We would not have anyone think that the value of prayer is to be measured by the clock, but our purpose is to impress on our minds the necessity of being much alone with God; and that if this feature has not been produced by our faith, then our faith is of a feeble and surface type."

# **FBC at Touching Miami With Love**

One of the most challenging parts of a mission trip is trying to explain the experience to those back home. You can tell numerous stories and show thousands of pictures and it just isn't the same as experiencing the trip. This beautiful thing happens on a mission trip. You bond with the team that you are on the trip with and you form relationships with the people you serve. The whole experience changes you. The Miami mission trip was no different.



What did we do in Miami? Well on the surface we led a devotion time, made crafts, played games, and taught the children about 4 d if ferent countries. What we really did in Miami was invest in the lives of children. We spent time reading one-on-one with kids who are struggling readers. We played games with kids. We talked with them and loved them. We encouraged them to do their very best. We learned their names and challenged them to make good choices. We hosted a cookout for their families & community. We danced with them, prayed with them, worshiped with them. We gave high fives and hugs. On the last day as we said goodbye, we may have even shed a few tears with them. This mission trip was not about building a house or running a clinic. The evidence of our week is not tangible. It is the relationships we built with the children and the staff.

How did our experience in Miami change us? We met children who are living in poverty so deep that we cannot wrap our minds around it. Most of the children come from single parent homes. Many of them have a parent who is deceased. Gangs, prison, drugs, and death are realities to these children in a way that we can't really understand. They live in a culture that is so far removed from ours. It is shocking, because we know that this culture exists here too. One thing remains constant regardless of culture or environment...kids are kids. They crave love and attention, and, at times, it was a little overwhelming. The children clamor around you wanting to switch name tags, play a trick, or just ask questions. They crave that moment of your undivided attention. They loved cooking with us almost as much as they loved eating what they had made! They were so appreciative of the crafts and took their time making them. They delighted in the simple things, but more than anything else, they wanted our time and attention.

The simple answer to how Miami changed us is that it made us more grateful, but I think the deeper answer is that it opened our eyes. We saw a culture very different from our own right here in the US. We saw poverty in a new light, as people struggling to make the best choices they can when good choices may not be available. We saw joy in the faces of children who have already overcome so much in their short lives.

Thank you for the way you have supported our Miami Mission Team! We have stories and pictures to share and we can't wait to let you know more about our trip. We felt your prayers, and gave many high fives and hugs on your behalf.

Bite 42: Unexpected church assets

"One Sunday, the translator I had scheduled for church informed me that he would be unavailable. I was panicking. When I arrived, the congregation told me that Chumcheath would translate for me. I had not heard Chumcheath speak English before, so I was a little worried. However, Chumcheath did a terrific job. I was very energized by this experience, seeing the church use its own assets to solve a problem. I helped someone participate more fully in the edification of the body of Christ. When I brought that need to the church, someone stepped up in a way they hadn't been asked to before, and the church has been stronger since then as a result."

#### Bite 43: Injustices for immigrants

"For a few months, I worked with a family where the mom, Wendy, was in deportation proceedings. Her husband, Geovani, had been suddenly thrust into the role of single dad and was also exposed as undocumented and was fearful. Immigrants are far from perfect, but a decision that for many of us would result in a traffic ticket, a fine, perhaps a humiliating night in jail and day in court, have life-changing consequences with the potential to destroy families and scar vulnerable children for life. That is the issue of injustice that I struggle with."
